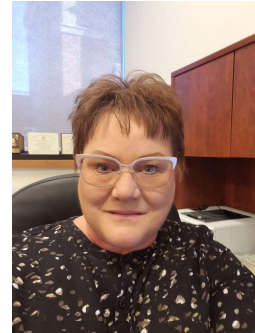


## Why I Chose Court Reporting
