

The pilot in Pennington County was featured by the <u>Rapid City Journal</u> on October 21.



Utilization and Outcomes




76% of encounters in October did not result in an emergency hold. Suicidal ideations, depression, and anxiety are the most common reasons the Virtual Crisis Care program has been used.
